May 2014

In May, Dr. David Morgan led a Walk and Talk at McIntosh Reserve Park focused on grasses and invasive plants. He pointed out a number of the 86 grasses surveyed within the park and a few of the 11 most worrisome invasive plants to be found there. Dr. Morgan also answered questions about other plants of interest we encountered along the way. Thanks to Stella Spyrou for this picture of a native Clematis growing below Council Bluff.

March 2014

Richard Littleton, certified beekeeper, presented a lively and informative program on bees and bee keeping. He showed us the equipment he uses as well as a demonstration hive with live bees. The Carroll County Ag Center can provide information about beekeeping and access to Richard for advice about bees (770-836-8546).



February 2014

Dr. Ben Steere, Department of Anthropology at UWG, presented a Walk and Talk about the "deep history" of the McIntosh area, referencing 13,000 years of human settlement in America and in our region in particular. He reviewed the way the land within the park would have been used by the early immigrants from Asia and the Native Americans and illustrated the various pre-historical periods with the kinds of archeological data – spear points, arrowheads, pottery - that might be found in the park. After the talk, the group visited the field by the river, which would have been home to many generations of Native



American families. Dr. Steere discussed the kinds of homes that would have been built and the kinds of agriculture, hunting practices and seasonal resources that would have been utilized. The last stop was a visit to an early 20th century home site, with old bricks and daffodils to mark the spot.

January 2014

Trudy Crunkleton, Park Manager for Carroll County, led a hike to explore the new trails recently developed within the north part of Moore's Bridge Park.



Also, in January, FOMR, The League of Women Voter's of Carrollton/Carroll County and the Department of Sociology at UWG co-sponsored a showing of the documentary film, "Chattahoochee - From Water War to Water Vision". The film, originally produced for Georgia Public Broadcasting, describes the bitter, 20-year old struggle between Alabama, Florida and Georgia over the waters of the Chattahoochee. Following the film, Dr. Jerry Stober updated viewers on developments in the tri-state controversy since the film was released.

November 2013


